Pay attention to gates

Pay attention to the Prophets

- What are A. Philip Randolph, Frederick Douglass, and Black news publications saying about immigration?

Pay attention to the shifts in thought

- A. Philip Randolph changed his perspective about immigration over time.

Follow the Freedom Train

- Visualize the train stations overflowing with Black Americans heading North for work.

Pay attention to the claim

- The immigration act of 1924 was the greatest federal action in US History-other than the Civil War Constitutional Amendments-in advancing the economic interest of the descendants of American Slavery and perhaps all Americans





1924 IMMIGRATION ACT AND THE POWERFUL CHAIN OF EVENTS

- Tightened labor market opened factory jobs to Black Americans
- Black Americans hit the rails and road during the Great Migration
- Labor Unions opened up to Black Americans and began to seek Black Members
- Tight Labor market increased real incomes of Black Americans four-fold
- 75 percent of Black Americans joined the middle class
- 50 percent of Black Americans left the South and pressure from their departure tightened the Southern Labor market to create improvements to wages and civil rights.



CENTENNIAL ANNIVERSARY OF 1924 IMMIGRATION ACT




- ❑ **The 1924 Immigration Act:** Greatly reduced employer access to foreign labor and instituted national-origins quotas that were highly discriminatory.
- ❑ **The results:** immigration was all but reserved for white, Western Europeans; but the lower numbers were a significant factor in employers recruiting domestic workers they had long overlooked. Decades of economic progress followed, especially for descendants of slaves.
- ❑ **Fixing the issues:** By the 1960s, politicians and activists were increasingly hostile to the discriminatory national-origin quotas. President Kennedy called for their abolition before he was assassinated. To honor him, Congress passed the 1965 Immigration Act.
- ❑ **The results:** Immigration has since quadrupled to over 1 million per year.
- ❑ **Conclusion:** We should take the best of both bills to make an immigration system that doesn't discriminate against nonwhite migrants and prioritizes American workers.

1924 got the "Who" wrong and the "How Many" right. **Avg Immigration under 200k annually**
1965 got the "Who" right and the "How Many" wrong. **Avg Immigration over 1 million annually**









Barbara Jordan 1st African American and first woman to be a keynote speaker at the Democratic National Convention. She was a Congresswoman who served on 3 key committees. Nixon Impeachment Committee, Voting Expansion Committee, and Immigration Committee. She was also a professor at the University of Texas.



A. Phillip Randolph Civil Rights Activist, Organized the first African American Led Labor Union. In 1963 he was the head of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Randolph also formed an important alliance with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.



Frederick Douglass Great orator, statesmen, and abolitionist. He escaped from slavery and became a leader in the abolitionist movement. He wrote books and was an advocate of the rights of freed slaves after the civil war.









COST & TRENDS

- **Illegal Immigration Trends:**

- 5.6 million illegal immigrants have been released into the U.S. since January 2021.
- 1.7 million "got-aways" were observed crossing the border from FY2021 to FY2023.

- **Housing Affordability:**

- A 5% increase in a city's immigrant population is linked to a 12% rise in rent for U.S.-born households, relative to income — exacerbating housing crises in many regions.

- **Labor Market Impact:**

- Immigration (legal and illegal) negatively affects wages and job availability for some U.S.-born workers, particularly the less educated. However, distinguishing the specific impact of illegal is difficult.
- In 2024, **one in three** U.S.-born men (16-64) with **no education beyond high school** are not in the labor force.
- The decline in working-class men's labor force participation is partly linked to job competition with illegal immigrants.



Let's Discuss

CRIMINOLOGY AND SOCIOLOGY

NBER (National Bureau of Economic Research) completed a study on consequences of immigration and it being a catalyst to a life of crime.

- 🕒 In 1980, less than 6% of Black high school dropouts were incarcerated. By 2000, it was 21%.

NBER continues their report to highlight the effect of mass immigration on Freedmen between 1980 and 2000

Mass immigration contributed to:


- 🕒 20 to 60 percent of the decline in wages
- 🕒 25 percent of the decline in employment
- 🕒 10 percent of the rise in incarceration rates among Blacks with a high school education or less


“[M]y view is that if these [immigrants] weren't coming into the workforce, the employers would be so desperate for workers that they would become a lobby on behalf of locking up fewer people, spending more money on education, fixing the problems in our society that are . . . preventing people from getting skills -- because [employers] would be out of workers and they'd be looking for them somewhere.”

“The right question to ask about crime and immigration might be how differently officials would run education and labor market policies if the volume of immigration were not so high. Would those changed policies result in far more Black men earning incomes through jobs and far less being incarcerated for crime?”


